1. *Offenders seek involvement on their own free will.*
2. *Circles focus on the future rather than the past.*
3. *Circles create an environment aimed at fostering acceptance and focusing on the individuals personal strengths.*
4. *Acceptance into circle is contingent upon:*

Completion of the application process

Accepting responsibility for past criminal behavior and acknowledging the harm they have caused to themselves and others

Accepting agreed upon recommendations

Participating in Community Service

Setting goals focused on law abiding and productive community behavior
